Chairman's Remarks

50 Years! CONGRATULATIONS! AND THANK YOU!

The Friends of Blackburn Cathedral have donated thousands of pounds and, equally

importantly, hours and hours of voluntary service to our Cathedral. We give thanks to Members past and present who have made it possible for us to enhance our Cathedral: its life, welcome, worship and buildings. We cannot do that without the support and stewardship of each and every one of you.

Even for people with peripheral and partial connection with the Church, major milestones of life are celebrated in its buildings. Baptisms, weddings and funerals gather families and friends into a Christian community and invite them to acknowledge and worship God. The wider population assumes that their parish church will always be there for these milestones. *Continued*

Most assume that "the government" or something as vague as "Church Commissioners" with millions of pounds at their disposal ensure the continuation of these places of worship because "they have always been there."

This is magnified in the case of cathedrals. There is much grumbling at the charging of admission fees at some of the oldest and largest cathedrals. Christian places of worship are expected to be open and sustain themselves. It is only very recently that the financial difficulties of some cathedrals have received media attention. These mentions mostly hint at mismanagement by senior staff; another strand of anti-clerical and anti-church coverage.

We know that it is the church community itself that supports parish churches. When the congregation gets too small to support the parish, a Diocese is faced with the heart-rending decision to close a church. Although cathedrals receive some help with the stipends of senior clergy, most of the budget is supplied by congregations, visitors, donations and legacies.

The Friends of Blackburn Cathedral celebrates the major milestone of its 50th Anniversary in 2017. A proud history of funding various elements of our Cathedral was summarised in the Spring Newsletter. The Friends continue to work hard to raise much needed finance to ensure that the Cathedral will be "good news for Lancashire" future generations. Please tell your parishes about the rich life of worship and music that takes place at our Cathedral. Invite people to services and concerts. Come to events sponsored by the Friends. We welcome and require more members to take our stewardship forward for the next 50 years.

We would especially invite you to join us in the celebration of the Friends' 50th Anniversary at the dinner on the 15th of September. The charity's success is based as much upon fellowship as on raising much needed finance for our Cathedral.

Treasurer & Membership Report

As we reach the middle of the financial year I am pleased to report a healthy financial position for the Friends.

We currently have a surplus of Income over Expense of just under £3,500 which is largely due to the extremely generous donations of almost £3,000 from our

members and this now takes our cash reserves to £23,300. The income generated last year from the Flower Festival and the generous legacies has meant we have, this year to date, contributed f7,835 to the Cathedral.

Unfortunately our annual subscription income continues to fall with just £933 collected this year as against £1,120 last year. If all our annual members paid then we could see a further £735 collected to our charity. It will mean those that have not paid their subscription will be taken off our mailing list in the near future. If you are one of those, a polite reminder will be in this mailing asking you to make your contribution as soon as possible.

As yet I have not made an application for Gift Aid from HMRC from the contributions of 2016 and expect a reasonable amount will be generated once I have made the submission.

Membership.

We welcome new members, Krystyna Adams, Adrian Wilson, Clifford & Carol Fishwick, Rev Malcolm & Anne Deane, Joan Dorich and Mr & Mrs F Robinson. This takes our total to 280. However 35 members have as yet not paid their subscription and 4 have part paid.

I hope the reminder in this newsletter prompts them to bring their subscriptions up to date.

A Message from The Dean

For Siân and myself, the past few months has been a time of mixed emotions, change and discovery. The transition from Chester to Blackburn has happened

almost without incident and we are slowly settling into new surroundings and establishing new friendships.

As a Lancashire lad, born and bred, I'm very much enjoying getting to know the county in which I was born and spent the early years of my life. Now as Dean of Lancashire's Cathedral, it is very important to me that our mission and ministry in not constrained by the geography of our location or by the limits of the

FOBC 50th ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATIONS A "FRIEND'S" REFLECTIONS

I have been asked, as the longest serving Council Member of the "Friends", to give some personal reflections over my active time involved with the Friends of Blackburn Cathedral.

This goes back to 1996 when the then Vice Chairman of the Friends was Canon David Rees who was also my Parish Vicar at St Mary's Penwortham. He suggested that both my wife Maureen and I might like to become "Friends" and take part and assist in the organization of various social events to raise funds for the Cathedral.

Having visited the Cathedral on a number of previous occasions including taking part in a BBC "Songs of Praise", my first involvement was to assist the then Chairman Keith Walmsley in arranging and overseeing a 3 day visit by some 38 "Friends" to the West Country including Bristol and the Cathedrals of Bath & Wells, Hereford & Worcester. Having enjoyed it so much, I became involved in the Lantern Appeal and in day trips to Ampleforth Abbey and Helmsley in 1998; a visit to Durham Cathedral in 1999; a 2 day visit to Lichfield & Shrewsbury Cathedral in 2000; and a day visit to Derby in 2001 taking in the Well-Dressings in the Peak District on route. At each Cathedral, we were warmly welcomed by their "Friends" and we have and continue to give a very warm welcome to visiting Cathedral Friends across the whole country.

In 2002, I was approached by the then new Dean Christopher Armstrong if I would consider becoming a Council Member of the Friends. I was subsequently elected at the AGM in 2003 and I realized that one of the prime objectives at that time was to promote the Cathedral. Deaneries were asked to host an event accompanied by Council Members in which the Cathedral's Young Peoples Choir would perform.

In addition, arrangements were made to invite Deaneries into the Cathedral on a Sunday afternoon for a conducted tour of the Cathedral led by George Kirby and myself and then having afternoon tea in the Crypt before attending evensong at 4pm. Visits to the Tunstall Deanery in 2003, Leyland Deanery in 2004 (to my own Parish of St Mary, Penwortham) and Chorley Deanery in 2006 took place. All were very successful and many barriers were broken down and misconceptions about the Cathedral put to bed.

Social events continued to flourish with visits to Stoneyhurst College in 2007 and Chester Cathedral in 2009. We continued to have dinners in the Crypt – two of the most memorable were firstly the celebratory dinner & exhibition in honour of John Hayward in 2004 and secondly was when Penny Warden was guest of honour at the dinner in 2009 and spoke with passion about her 13 paintings hung around the Cathedral walls depicting "The Journey".

I arranged, on behalf of the Friends, three sponsored charity Morecambe Bay Walks in 2009, 2010 and 2011 some more successful than others but each of them very memorable for different reasons.

Friends of the various Cathedrals and Abbeys up and down the country have met every other year when one Cathedral hosts usually a two day event. For many years, we have sent representatives to share ideas and consider best practice with fellow "Friends". In the recent past, Salisbury hosted in 2006, Lincoln in 2008 and we hosted the 2010 National Conference of Cathedral Friends when we were based at Whalley Abbey. Feedback was most positive and we have continued to send representatives to subsequent Conferences where we have renewed old friendships and shared good ideas.

It is impossible to do justice to what the Friends of Blackburn Cathedral have achieved over the last 50 years but there are three which stand out in my mind.

Visit to the Globe Theatre in London

On Saturday 3rd June a group of twenty one, representing the Friends of Blackburn Cathedral, travelled down to London for a special visit to Southwark Cathedral and Shakespeare's Theatre. The purpose of

the visit was to further develop the links with the Friends group based at Southwark Cathedral and to build on the connections made from

the annual conferences. It was also an opportunity to enjoy an evening together at The Globe Theatre following on from the three hundred year anniversary of Shakespeare's death in 2016. As part of the 'Summer of Love' season, the play being shown that weekend in June



was the much loved and well-known, Romeo and Juliet.

During the Saturday afternoon, prior to the evening's performance of Romeo and Juliet, the group were treated to a comprehensive guided tour of The Globe Theatre which helped to put the play, the theatre itself and our experiences in their historical contexts. We learnt that the theatre is a 'faithful reconstruction' of the open air playhouse first built in 1599. Our informative tour explored the life of Shakespeare, the London where he lived and some of the key characters and plays he created.



Prior to the evening's performance of Romeo and Juliet, some members of the group visited St Paul's Cathedral and at short notice, Joe Kennedy who was recently Verger at Blackburn Cathedral and who is now based at St Paul's, delivered an excellent and thorough tour of the famous and beautiful building. The group really enjoyed the visit and were extremely appreciative of Joe's time and insight. b) maintaining, beautifying, improving and adding to the fabric, fittings, ornaments, monuments, services and music of the Cathedral and maintaining and improving the precincts thereof;

c) providing a means whereby people who have at heart the wellbeing, mission and purpose of the Cathedral can be kept in touch with its life and work and can contribute by prayer to the work of the Cathedral, by personal services in the cause of the Cathedral and its works, and by financial provision of its needs as and when funds are available;

d) power to raise funds and to invite and receive contributions provided that in raising funds the charity shall not undertake any substantial permanent trading activities and shall conform to any relevant requirements of the law

How Do I leave a Legacy to The Friends?

Legacies

What is a Legacy?

Leaving money to charity in your Will as a gift is called a 'legacy' and is the

foundation for many charities being able to continue their work.

You don't have to be rich or famous to leave a gift to a charity in your Will. You can leave as large, or small amount as you like.

Of 35% of people who say they are willing to give a gift in their Will to a charity, only about 6.3% do. If you were to make a charitable gift in your Will, this would really make a difference.

There are three main types of legacy;

- A sum of money (e.g. £100) called a pecuniary legacy
- A gift of an item (e.g. A painting, stocks or shares) called a specific legacy
- A residuary gift what remains of the donor's estate after debts, expenses, pecuniary and specific legacies have been paid out

It is also possible to leave a legacy for a specific purpose in a Will such as a specific project or activity, which could be placed in a Trust.

Do I pay tax on a Legacy?

No; and legacies which are given to charity could reduce the amount of inheritance tax which would otherwise be payable. The threshold for payment of inheritance tax changes from time to time, and the laws of inheritance tax are complex. It is strongly recommended you seek legal advice should payment of inheritance tax be relevant to your estate.

What if I don't have a Will?

It is easy to find a solicitor or will writer to help advise you, and they often will provide a fixed quote. A Will ensures your property and possessions are left to those you love, in the way you would like, and not relying on the laws of intestacy.

Having a Will can make things easier for your loved ones you leave behind. It can also plan for tax purposes, the best way to deal with your assets, and can create trusts as may be required.

As a Will is a formal legal document it must comply with certain legal requirements to be valid.

You can write your own will, however it is possible that a minor omission may invalidate the document or parts of it. It is strongly recommended you have any Will you have drafted checked by a professional.

What if I already have a Will?

It may be appropriate in some circumstances to make simple changes or add to your Will by way of a document called a 'codicil'. In this way, additional gifts including legacies can be inserted into a Will. There are legal formalities for a codicil in the same way as a Will, and it is therefore advisable for this to be completed by a solicitor or will-writer.

Why should I consider leaving a Legacy to The Friends?

The Friends of Blackburn Cathedral would be incredibly grateful if you wish to remember them in your Will, to help them continue the good work of enhancing the fabric of the building of the Cathedral, as well as being ambassadors and fund-raisers.

In leaving a legacy for the Friends, you would be helping the charity to fulfil it's aims and objects, which are:

a) arousing, stimulating and maintaining public interest in the Cathedral;
